

 - Opening Reception Saturday August 13 Noon to 4:00 p.m.







An Exhibit from a Motley Crew... By Holly K. Hurd

Back in January I put out a call to assemble a group of women artists of color: 'Spirit Notations for ReCalibration : A Clandestine Operation', I called it. Unlike most collectives, this one would focus on talking art and personal development. We would not be working on a group project. We would merely develop with each other for 5 months and see what blossomed from our individual worlds. Being totally open to whatever responses came back, I felt like I cast my line into a vast body of water and from there I waited to see who would bite. My only hope was for the participation of artists of various mediums and that's exactly what I got. Painters, writers and even one M.C. (a rapper) from 20's to seniors. My invitational message was vague, basically asking them to trust my guidance in a process that would speak to our creativity and exploration of ourselves as women, as women of color and as women artists. Without a clear view of what they were getting themselves into we began meeting once a month. We were consistent only about eating good food and every meeting went its own perfect direction. Half way through our meetings one member presented an opportunity for us to exhibit collectively. This was not part of our initial plan and everyone in the group was NOT a visual artist. Nonetheless, the group was excited and decided they were up for the challenge.

After inspiration, a host of emotions began making their way around the group. ... Nervousness, unexpected fear, healing, strength, insecurity, you name it.

People were having a myriad of experiences with the pieces they were working on while life was happening: taking care of family members, rescuing friends from abusive partnerships, but creation was happening too.

The day it was time to hang you can imagine the frustration of our curator when only 4 out of 7 people were ready. The exhibit would not be up completely for another few days but oh when it was.... Every woman's life experience was strewn across those walls. No one discussed in advance what their pieces would be for the exhibit, but when it came together the common threads and themes woven between the works were powerful. It all spoke of birth, nurturing, growth, prayer, love and power. ...Woman things.

I'm sure we all know that working in groups can be beautiful but ever challenging. I believe there is a certain respect that must be present in every creative process. Creativity is a powerful thing! ...Creativity among groups of women even more powerful! But when the outcome is chalk full of emotionality and has the ability to speak and heal those that come in contact with it, that is when we must move past the squabbling, the stress involved and simply bow down and RESPECT the power of the process and celebrate that creativity is a true gift to us all.

Some tips from readers...American Patchwork & Quilting - April 2016

PACKING BACKING

Hotel ironing boards have very little padding. Because of that, travel with two pieces of batting cut to the size of an ironing board...insert under a hotel ironing board cover.

PORTABLE PIECES - Start sewing when you get to your destination

Cut the fabric in advance. To transport the cut pieces, pin them to wax paper as they are to be sewn, which makes them secure and light to carry.

BOBBIN KEEPER

To sew on the go, use a plastic film canister that has a hole drilled in the lid. Put the bobbins in the canister, pull the thread through the hole, snap on the lid, and stitch.

COMPARTMENTALIZING

Repurpose a fruit tray from the supermarket as a supply organizer. The round center portion fits my pincushion perfectly, and the other compartments are great for sewing needles, pins, etc. There is even a cover for the tray so that you can take it with you to retreats and classes

ALL PURPOSE TRAY

Modify a TV trays by attaching a cutting mat to a board for a sturdy cutting surface and also layered batting and ironing board fabric to make an ironing surface. Add handles and locks so the modified trays are easy to pack up and carry to retreats
