IRIS A. **FAWKINS** Person of the guarter IRIS HAWKINS

When I first read Iris Hawkins biography, to say I was impressed is an understatement. We have a real powerhouse in our guild.

The following is an edited excerpt on behalf of Iris who was the 2017 Eleanor Gehres Award Recipient

This annual honor recognizes an individual or organization that has made a significant contribution to the Denver Public Library Western History Collection.

Iris has served as a volunteer and a docent with the Denver Public Library since 1992. As a member of the Black Genealogy Search Group which had been founded at the Denver Public Library, she was already interested in family research. Iris served as president of the Black Genealogy Search Group, and is a frequent contributor to the society's quarterly, *Black Tracks*. She's been the newsletter manager since April 2006, and also served for many years as the Library Liaison between the Colorado Genealogical Society and the Genealogy Collection of the DPL.

Iris holds a Masters of Social Work from the Graduate School of Social Work, New York University. Arriving in Denver from New York in 1991, she assisted the counselors at George Washington High School working with juniors and seniors. Using her skills and interests she's participated in the national conferences of the Afro-American Historical and Genealogical Society. Hawkins further honed her research skills by attending the national conferences of the National Genealogical Society and the Federation of Genealogical Societies. Iris was cited in *The Power of Black Women: Progress, Predicaments and Possibilities*, a paper presented at the Anniversary Conference of the Association of Black Women in Higher Education, Inc, May 5, 1988, held in New York.

Irls, along with 4 others, transcribed and published *The American Woodmen Insurance Ledger: 5 June 1901 to 31 July 1907: Index*, 2007.

As an active volunteer Iris worked on the *Colorado Brides Project, an index to all Colorado marriage records from 1859 through 1939.* This resulted in the *Colorado Marriage Index,* a major resource for Colorado genealogical and local history research.

Iris assists researchers and contributes not only to the local and national genealogical communities but her talents serve the Western History researcher.

Iris was consulted and involved in *Black Genesis: A Resource Book for African-American Genealogy* in 2003 and is the noted author, editor or contributor of several works some of which include

- 1870 Colorado Census Index of Minorities, 2001.
- Colorado Statesman: Index of Funeral Notices, Obituaries, and News Articles: 29 October 1904 17 April 1954, 2001.
- Five Points Neighborhood of Denver: All Name Index, 2001.
- A Genealogy Book for Young African Americans and Others of African Background: A Beginning Guide to Collecting Family History, 2002.
- World War I Selective Service System Draft Registration Cards, 1917 1918. Minorities Enrollments, Colorado, 2003.

Twentyfour guild members dribbled in over Thursday, Nov. 2, and Friday, Nov. 3, to spend time together—quilting, eating, laughing, sewing, playing games, cutting, dancing, consulting, and getting to know one another better.

Two quilts were completely finished—with binding—and about 18 tops were completed, plus various other parts of projects. At least two carloads traveled back down the mountain to Lyons Quilting shop where quilters found the perfect fabric at a discount! Retreat organizer Karen Blackmon supervised several games to help us become better acquainted. She also provided a pattern for a Scissor Satchel—in case we didn't bring enough to do—and even made a game out of distributing the ugly fabrics (Some of them are doozies!) for comfort quilts.

The setting is gorgeous! The center is of course chalet-style with full windows facing, I believe, Mt. Meeker—a breathtaking view, on Friday. On Saturday, the fog was so thick, the mountain completely disappeared. And on Sunday morning, it was obscured by 4 or 5 inches of heavy, wet snow. What variety!

Kudos to Karen for pulling it all together. And thanks to everyone because each woman contributed something special!

Personally it was a great opportunity to sew but I loved learning more about my fellow quilters and laughing. We laughed so hard. What a great bunch of lovely, smart, accomplished women! I can't wait till next year!



Quilting for Family by De Lois M. Powell


Plans are (as you well know) for me to gift a quilt to each of my 10 grandchildren, five boys and five girls. Well, plans have been upgraded to include an adopted niece, my own three children, another familial niece, etc., etc., etc., So, even on my leisure activity (Quilting) I am driven to multi-tasking!

I am doing 12-inch blocks of triangles and squares to complete an 84×96 inch quilt for Alicia; 10-inch blocks will form the 90 x 90 inch of "uncontrolled crazy" for Kaya. Seven-inch square, multicolored, paper-pieced blocks will be combined with seven-inch select colors of background blocks to complete a bordered 38×80 -inch quilt for my niece, Jada. Appliqued elephants, complete with tails and ears, will be placed on 13-inch blocks for my dear, darling Caleb; while button-eyed ginger bread men will be appliqued onto 9 inch-blocks of shades of blue to complete a 54×72 inch throw for his twin brother, Joshua.

Eight-inch blocks of jewelry-accented African girls form a 54 x 72 inch piece for my African granddaughter, Mel Yann (her brother, Lebni, wants a sunflower pattern on his quilt). A sixteen block log cabin pattern, arranged as purple and green crosses, is currently crying out for its binding and completion for my daughter, Geneva, mother of the African girl and boy. Well, I am almost there, with additional designs to begin in 2018!

So, you see why even in my leisure-time, I multi-task! O, yeah, just mailed out a "crazy for love" $32 \times 39 1/2$ inch "completed quilt" to Infinity, my 5 month old, adopted niece.

Whew! In my day job, I am happy that I Do MATH! Thanks sister/brother quilters for an inspirational 2017!




