

Hey, we did so many classes together, but do you remember when we joined with African





American Quilters and Collectors Guild to invited Lola Jenkins to teach several art classes on Portraits Quilts? Lola Jenkins shared her remarkable story and taught us her technique for art quilts. What a treat? I am sure she remembers us as much as we remember her. The highlight of that class, as I look back, was knowing that I shared an art quilt experience with Mother Brown (97 years young) and Sister Geneva Chapman (12/6/1933 -3/25/2015). Reflecting on that time together makes me miss you more than ever.

Then, there was the trip to Lincoln Hills to visit the Historical Winks Lodge, a black resort community in Gilpin County. Opened in 1928 by Denver businessman Obrey Wendell Hamlet. It was reopened just for us to go back in time and discover our past. Do you remember the caravan of cars up the mountain on a beautiful July day? We carried our





red, white and blue stars in remembrance of Independence Day. Ann Worsencroft laid out our blocks in wonderful designs. Brenda Ames took the lead in putting the stars into quilts. Those stars still hang in the lodge. You are all stars. You are the stars in my quilt of life.



You know I have always liked that intersection of quilting and history. Brenda will remember how we met in 2005. We both were volunteering to be docents for the **Gees Bend Quilt Exhibit** at the **Denver Art Museum**. Those quilts are filled with history. Likewise, **Melinda Walker** will remember the exhibits at the **Grace Stiles African American Center** and the **Justina Ford/Black American West Museum** where we never missed an opportunity to hang our quilts. We would suck in the stories of our past. But it was in 2011, at Manual High School where Ms. Wilkerson was speaking, that interest in my heritage was awakened. **Joanne Walton** was hanging my favorite quilt. historical pinch when I saw all the quilts there together in the back drop of so many people interested in a book on our shared history. Each quilt holds a history and is a place holder in our shared history.



Chris Jacques, do you remember the words of Harriet Tubman printed on fabric you gave me? I plan to combine it with blocks received from Cynthia Martin. (You remember Cynthia Martin who guided us through the 9/11 Freedom Quilt Project). Those incredible pieces of fabric will make an amazing quilt honoring Harriet Tubman someday. Mary Lassiter, thank you so much for the gift of fabric and blocks to commemorate my retirement from Denver Public Schools. One day in the near future, I will make a quilt in tribute to those years of learning from my students. This year, I received the one quilt that I never wanted to be a recipient of. You all gave me a 'comfort quilt' for the loss of my mother. Thank you and thank you for the thoughtful cards. They will become a part of a quilt tribute to my mom. You know as much about our shared quilting and non-quilting experiences as I do. You have blessed me with experiences, fabric and blocks that I will never forget. (Or if I do you, will you remind me?) I realized quickly and happily that this letter could go on and on because "We got it like that."

But, what I want you to know that as of September 12, 2015, because of you ladies that invited me to the Freeman's Presentation at the Blair Caldwell African American Research Library, (and you know who you are), I am now on a journey to document my family story. I was only ever a beginning quilter. LOL! But now I am also a novice genealogist. What can I say? At the last quilt meeting I attended, we were on the second floor at the library. You were meeting while I was in the stacks searching for books on genealogy. The change in me after 30 years of quilting is remarkable. I never thought my stash would be relegated to the garage, but I had to make room for binders and bins filled with documents on my ancestors. I have said it! It is true! I love you all and I love that you love to quilt. But tracing my family history is something I am compelled to do at this time in my life.

Thank you for all you do to reinvigorate the textile arts. I appreciate you, your talent, your patience and your perseverance. You know I won't be far because quilting intersects history and quilting is part of my legacy.
